Year 1 and 2

Pupils should be taught:

- * to use a range of materials creatively to design and make products
- A to use drawing, painting and sculpture to develop and share their ideas, experiences and imagination
- 4 to develop a wide range of art and design techniques in using colour, pattern, texture, line, shape, form and space
- * about the work of a range of artists, craft makers and designers, describing the differences and similarities between different practices and disciplines, and making links to their own work.

Skills and Fechniques Creating Ideas

Skills and Techniques

Drawing

Experiment with a variety of different materials: pencils, pastels, charcoal, pen, paint, crayons, erasers.

Begin to use different pressures to create different qualities of lines and tones.

Start to develop a variety of different drawing techniques to create texture and tone in their work such as: hatching, stippling, scribbling and blending.

Hold different paintbrushes, tools and media correctly to demonstrate more control over the marks made.

Work on different scales and surfaces.

Look at primary and secondary resources and begin to observe more carefully to create some correct marks and tones.

Start to make some changes to improve drawings.

Start to understand the colour wheel.

Mix primary colours to make secondary colours.

Name the primary and secondary colours and build on confidence in mixing colours and tints.

Begin to understand how complementary colours are used in art and design to make images and font stand out.

Explore how to make darker and lighter tints of colour by adding more or less water to pigment or adding white or black paint. Begin to experiment and control the type of marks made using a variety of painting techniques e.g. pointillism, wash, layering, mark making and blotting.

Explore painting on different surfaces and scales.

Begin to understand how colours can be used to create different feelings.

Experience printing with a variety of different hard and soft objects.

Use equipment and media correctly to create a clean image.

Use printmaking to create a pattern and decorate a form.

Express links between emotions and colour.

Explore basic monoprint, impressed print and layering of print.

Begin to recognise different forms of print: books, ceramics and textiles.

Observe drawings of the figure and use foil to model shape to simple armatures. Use coil techniques in clay to build a form with pattern. Create patterns and imaginative artworks using natural forms. Learn about and recognise 3D forms in other times and cultures. Collaborate with others and increase confidence in cutting and shaping by making a large artwork in recycled plastics. To create junk art and explore various techniques to fix, incase and slot objects together. Make forms inspired by ancient art using a simple frame, weaving techniques, yarns, wool and plastic. . |
