
Our Lady of the Rosary Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural Curriculum Design

Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural (SMSC) development is the over-arching umbrella that encompasses personal development across the whole curriculum.

Our Lady of the Rosary's SMSC development demonstrates how the values and beliefs of the Catholic Church inform and unify every aspect of school life. Our curriculum is holistic and comprehensive. It is enquiry based, exciting and engaging for all learners and is relevant to the school's own context and postcode. SMSC learning opportunities are broad, balanced, challenging and innovative; they grab children's interest, develop curiosity, resilience and engagement. Our curriculum creatively moves faith into action, putting the 'Gospel on the Street' through the delivery of the statutory requirements of the R.E. Curriculum, EYFS Early Years Framework and National Curriculum, with Christ at the centre. SMSC deepens children's knowledge and understanding and ensures transferable knowledge and skills are evidenced. Pupils develop their advocacy skills for change for those in the greatest need in society and recognise the importance of their own role in protecting 'Our Common Home'. Pupils engage with really big questions of purpose and meaning, raising critical and higher order thinking skills across the curriculum.



The spiritual development of pupils is shown by their:

ability to be reflective about their own beliefs (religious or otherwise) and perspective on life knowledge of, and respect for, different people's faiths, feelings and values sense of enjoyment and fascination in learning about themselves, others and the world around them use of imagination and creativity in their learning willingness to reflect on their experiences

The moral development of pupils is shown by their:

ability to recognise the difference between right and wrong and to readily apply this understanding in their own lives, recognise legal boundaries and, in so doing, respect the civil and criminal law of England

understanding of the consequences of their behaviour and actions

interest in investigating and offering reasoned views about moral and ethical issues and ability to understand and appreciate the viewpoints of others on these issues.

The social development of pupils is shown by their:

use of a range of social skills in different contexts, for example working and socialising with other pupils, including those from different religious, ethnic and socio-economic backgrounds

willingness to participate in a variety of communities and social settings, including by volunteering, cooperating well with others and being able to resolve conflicts effectively

acceptance and engagement with the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs; they develop and demonstrate skills and attitudes that will allow them to participate fully in and contribute positively to life in modern Britain.

The cultural development of pupils is shown by their:

understanding and appreciation of the wide range of cultural influences that have shaped their own heritage and that of others understanding and appreciation of the range of different cultures in the school and further afield as an essential element of their preparation for life in modern Britain

ability to recognise, and value, the things we share in common across cultural, religious, ethnic and socio-economic communities

knowledge of Britain's democratic parliamentary system and its central role in shaping our history and values, and in continuing to develop Britain willingness to participate in and respond positively to artistic, musical, sporting and cultural opportunities

interest in exploring, improving understanding of and showing respect for different faiths and cultural diversity and the extent to which they understand, accept and respect diversity.

This is shown by their respect and attitudes towards different religious, ethnic and socio-economic groups in the local, national and global communities

OLOR will work towards the Rights Respecting Schools Awards (RRSA) Bronze and Silver and the SMSC Quality Mark in 2021-2022 OLOR has worked with schools and leaders across the country on a 'Building the Kingdom' CPD programme since 2018.
